

# Anti-tobacco art going on display

Eighth-graders' art will be on display this month at a local gallery.

Each year, Sleeping Giant Middle School students participate in a Park County Tobacco Use Prevention Program's billboard art contest.

The students are asked to create an image that shows life at its best — tobacco-free, a PCTUPP news release said. One of the images is often selected to be reproduced on a Livingston-

area billboard.

All entries in the billboard art contest will be on display at the Livingston Center for Art and Culture, 119 S. Main St., from May 4 to 16. Gallery hours are 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday. The billboards illustrate the slogan, "Be Your Best! Be Tobacco Free!"

The goal of the project is to "engage youth in producing healthy lifestyle messages for the community," showing life without tobacco, the news

release said.

"The billboards illustrate an important message about being tobacco free," Adrienne Fabich, Youth Educator for the program, said in the release. "Using tobacco takes away freedom, health, wealth, and limits future job opportunities. Young people, interested in living their lives to the fullest, are learning to reject tobacco."
