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The Implementation Planning Process

The implementation planning committee – comprised of Livingston HealthCare’s leadership team– participated in an implementation planning process to systematically and thoughtfully respond to all issues and opportunities identified through their community health needs assessment (CHNA) process.

Livingston HealthCare partnered with the Park County Health Department to carry out the CHNA in the spring of 2022 to determine the most important health needs and opportunities for Park County, Montana. “Needs” were identified as the top issues or opportunities rated by respondents during the survey process or during focus groups when carrying out the Community Health Needs Assessment. The implementation planning committee identified the most important health needs to be addressed by reviewing the CHNA, secondary data, community demographics, and input from representatives of the broad interest of the community, including those with public health expertise.

The implementation planning committee reviewed the priority recommendations provided by the community steering committee and determined which needs or opportunities could be addressed considering Livingston HealthCare’s parameters of resources and limitations. The committee then prioritized the needs/opportunities using the additional parameters of the organizational vision, mission, and values, as well as existing and potential community partners. Participants then created a goal to achieve through strategies and activities, as well as the general approach to meeting the stated goal (i.e., staff member responsibilities, timeline, potential community partners, anticipated impact(s))

The prioritized health needs as determined through the assessment process and which the facility will be addressing relates to the following healthcare issues:

- **1 Behavioral Health**
- **2 Community Wellness**
 - **Housing/Income inequality**
 - **Children and families**
- **3 Access to Care**

In addressing the issues, Livingston HealthCare seeks to:

- a) Improve access to healthcare services
- b) Enhance the health of the community
- c) Advance medical or health knowledge

1. Livingston Healthcare's Existing Presence in the Community

- Fall Health Fair – annual event providing a variety of services, screenings, and entertainment.
- Educational Sessions- ongoing education to community through free classes including perinatal education, lactation consultation, Lunch and Learn sessions, diabetes management, strong people, fall prevention and balance and more. Refer to the website for upcoming events.
- Wellness programs- support of wellness programming for healthy lifestyles, including nutrition and exercise.
- Financial assistance programs – LHC has two certified patient financial counselors to assist with insurance enrollment and a medication assistance program to improve access to prescription medications

- 95.5% of Park County's population white, and 1.3% is American Indian or Alaska Native
- 6.3% of Park County's population has disability status
- 24.4% of Park County's population is 65 years and older
- 1,351 veterans in Park County

Size of County and Remoteness

- 17,191 people in Park County
- 6.1 people per square mile

Socioeconomic Measures

- 20% of children live in poverty
- 12.6% of persons are below the federal poverty level
- 9.7% of adults (age<65) are uninsured; 7% of children less than age 18, are uninsured

- 37% of Park County residents are on Medicare or Medicaid

- 28.6% of adults are considered obese
